The pandemic of Covid-19 has hit hard food value chains in Africa, through domestic and foreign trade effects on supply and demand. Its impact has been all the more important as this sector has long suffered from structural weaknesses that hamper its capacity to provide food security, expand, and create jobs. Hence the need to debate on which measures to take and which policies to implement in order to increase the resilience of food systems, in preparation for the shocks of different nature (economic, climatic, sanitary...) that may occur again in the future.

In this context, the conference will first focus on the consequences of the pandemic on farmers and food processors in Africa.

Looking beyond the current crisis, it will reflect on some actions that might strenghten their resistance to shocks: a *better coordination of food value chains,* the *building-up of food reserves,* and an easier access to credit and insurance. As usual in FARM conferences, priority will be given to stakeholders' testimonies and to an interactive conversation with the participants.

The conference will then take back a topic already addressed in 2019, the importance of which is magnified by the pandemic: the weight of the informal

sector. In light of the disruptions caused by the Covid-19, what are the consequences of this situation for the resilience of African food value chains? Which initiatives can be taken by private firms and governments to improve workers's social protection and facilitate the inclusion of all segments of the food sector, in order to increase tax revenues to finance the development of the continent?
